





Applying for Admission

If you have never attended Clovis Community College (new or transfer), or have been away for two ungraded semesters or more (former), you must apply online at www.cloviscollege.edu. Students who have been continuously enrolled (attended Fall 2017) are not required to complete an application.

New and Transfer Students Registration

Students who are first to complete the matriculation process (see Student Success/Matriculation) are granted the first opportunity to register and select courses.

Student Success/Matriculation

Matriculation is the process that allows the college and the student to form a partnership which helps you attain your goals. We ask you to commit yourself to an educational objective and we will commit ourselves to helping you succeed. The components of matriculation are as follows:

Student Success Checklist

STEP #1

APPLICATION: Complete the online SCCC admission application and submit. Available online at www.cloviscollege.edu > Admissions & Aid > Apply to Clovis Community College > Admissions Requirements & Application

STEP #2

SCCCD E-MAIL ACTIVATION: Activate your SCCC E-mail account at mail.office365.com and plan to check it regularly (It is important to check your SCCC e-mail, as all district communication is sent via SCCC email)

STEP #3

ORIENTATION: Complete the SCCC Student Success Online Orientation available at www.cloviscollege.edu > Admissions & Aid > Orientation > Online Orientation

STEP #4

ASSESSMENT: Complete the required components of the placement test for appropriate placement in English (reading/writing) and math OR meet with an academic counselor to discuss placement using multiple measures. STEP #5

FINANCIAL AID (Optional): Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) online (Available at www.fafsa.ed.gov)

STEP #6

ACADEMIC COUNSELING/STUDENT EDUCATION PLAN (SEP): Meet with an academic counselor to develop a semester by semester Student Education Plan. To schedule an appointment with a CCC Counselor and develop a SEP, please contact the CCC Counseling Department at (559) 325-5230 OR by going to www.cloviscollege.edu > Student Services > Counseling > eSARS

STEP #7

WEBADVISOR: Log into WebAdvisor: a website we use for records, financial aid, searching and registering for classes, updating information, unofficial transcripts and more. (see back for instructions)

STEP #8

REGISTRATION: Registration is available on WebAdvisor (online) or may be completed in person at the Admissions and Records (A&R) office. To register with A&R, select courses, complete a registration form, and submit to A&R for processing. Pay your fees by the assigned due date to ensure you won't be dropped from your courses.

STEP #9

CLASSES:

- Registered Classes: Attend the 1st day of instruction for all classes you are registered or waitlisted.
- To Add a Class(es): Attend the 1st day of instruction for the classes you want to add. Receive an authorization code from the instructor, get a counselor to sign the "Add Card" (if required), and add online through WebAdvisor or in person at the Admissions and Records office.
- To Drop a Class(es): To officially drop classes you are registered for, students may drop online through WebAdvisor or in person at the Admissions and Records office. Drop deadlines are posted on www.cloviscollege.edu. Remember: Students are responsible for dropping classes.

STEP #10

FOLLOW-UP VISIT TO COUNSELING: Follow-up with a counselor to review and update a Student Education Plan (SEP) as needed. Online Counseling is also available at www.cloviscollege.edu > Student Services > Counseling > Online Academic Counseling.

Log Into your WebAdvisor and SCCC CD Email

WebAdvisor: WebAdvisor is the system where you will complete your online orientation, add and drop classes, and see your financial and academic profile. Your WebAdvisor login is your seven digit student ID number. Your password will be your first name initial (upper case) + last name initial (lowercase) + date of birth in mmddyy format.

Example: John Smith with date of birth = 01/01/1995 and student ID# 0123456

SCCCD Student Email: Your SCCC CD student email account is where you will receive enrollment, financial aid, fee payment due dates, and other college/ student updates and information. How to Schedule an Appointment for Assessment Test and/or to See a Counselor

Students are encouraged to walk-in to see a counselor for general information and questions.

- Specific Support Program-Counseling Appointment (i.e., DSP&S, EOP&S, Veterans, etc.)
- Testing Services (i.e., Make-Up, Test Accommodations)
- Comprehensive Student Educational Plan (SEPC)

How to Register for Courses using WebAdvisor

To register for courses complete the following steps.

Step 1: Log into WebAdvisor (See Above.)

Step 2: Click the Students tab

Step 3: Under the Registration section, click Search/Register for Sections

Step 4: Enter the following information:

Once information is entered, CLICK SUBMIT.

Step 5: Check mark the course you would like to enroll into. **CLICK SUBMIT.**

Step 6: Choose the Action from the drop down menu (register or waitlist). **CLICK SUBMIT.**

Matriculation Exemptions

Certain students may be exempt from several components of matriculation including assessment, orientation, and counseling/advising.

A student may be exempt from participation in assessment if the student meets the following criteria:

- 1) The student has submitted evidence (e.g., official grade report or transcript) which provides verification of satisfactory completion of the college level prerequisite course; or
- 2) the student chooses not to participate.

A student may be exempt from participation in orientation and/or counseling/advising if the student meets two or more of the following criteria:

- 1) The student chooses not to participate;
- 2) the student has completed 12 or more transferable units;
- 3) the student has completed an associate degree or higher;
- 4) the student has certain educational goals:
 - a. to maintain a certificate or license;
 - b. personal development (intellectual, cultural); or
 - c. to complete credits for a high school diploma or G.E.D.

For a Matriculation Exemption, contact the Counseling Office.

English/Math Placement Test

After submitting an application for admission, new students should schedule an appointment or testing date to take the English/Math placement test offered by Clovis Community College. The tests are designed to assist students in selecting college courses that match their current abilities. The placement tests are coordinated by Student Services. A Clovis Community College placement test schedule, with times, dates, and locations, is available online at www.cloviscollege.edu.

Prerequisites

Prerequisite courses must be completed with a "C" (2.0) grade or better prior to enrolling in the next level course. See course listing to determine whether a particular course has any prerequisites. A student may challenge a prerequisite under certain conditions (see "Prerequisites challenge procedures" on this page). Contact the Counseling Office for the prerequisite challenge form and details on the conditions that apply.

- Students currently enrolled in courses that satisfy a prerequisite will be allowed to register in the next level course. However if a "C" grade or better is not achieved, students will be dropped from the higher level class.
- If you have met prerequisites through the assessment process or by completion of the required course, you may proceed to use the online (WebAdvisor) registration system.
- If you believe that you have met the prerequisite through some other means (e.g. completion of the prerequisite course at another college), you must see a counselor BEFORE registration to obtain a prerequisite clearance. You must have your college and/or high school transcripts on file or in hand prior to seeing your counselor for prerequisite clearance. Once the prerequisite has been cleared, you may use the online (WebAdvisor) registration system to register for the course(s).

Academic Counseling

Counseling services are available to all students. Results from placement tests may be used as part of the multi-criteria process to assist counselors in determining appropriate course placement. First-time, full-time, or degree-seeking students will be counseled prior to registration. A student educational plan (SEP) will be partially developed at this time. The SEP will be reviewed and fully developed during the first semester of attendance. It is the student's responsibility to contact their counselor and schedule an appointment to review and/or update their SEP. Online counseling is also available via the Clovis Community College website at www.cloviscollege.edu>Student Services> counseling> online academic counseling

Prerequisite Challenge Procedures

A prerequisite challenge requires written documentation, explanation of alternative course work, background or abilities which adequately prepare the student for the course. A Prerequisite/Corequisite Challenge Form may be obtained from the Counseling Office, and should be returned to the Counseling Office. Reasons for filing a prerequisite/corequisite challenge may include one or more of the following:

- 1) A prerequisite/corequisite is not available.
- 2) The prerequisite/corequisite was met at another institution.
- 3) The student has the documented knowledge or ability to succeed in the course without meeting the prerequisite.
- 4) The student believes the prerequisite/corequisite is discriminatory or being applied in a discriminatory manner
- 5) The prerequisite is not necessary for success in the course.

Class “WAIT LIST” Requirements

When unable to find an open section of a course, students may have the option of being placed on a “WAIT LIST” for a specific section of the course. Please note that the following rules apply:

1. Students may add their name to any available “WAIT LIST” up to the last day of registration prior to the beginning of the class.
2. Students will be added to a “WAIT LIST” on a first come, first-serve basis.
3. Students cannot be placed on a “WAIT LIST” prior to their registration appointment date.
4. Students on a “WAIT LIST” will have first priority for any seats in a “full” class that may subsequently become available during the first 20% of the course PROVIDED that they attend each and every class meeting (for 18 week semester courses, this is the first 3 weeks of class).
5. A “WAIT LIST” will be available only for current class sections that are “full” (that is, the class has reached its “maximum class size”). No “WAIT LISTS” will be available for “canceled” class sections or class sections that are not yet “full.” Not all classes have wait lists.
6. Students cannot be placed on a “WAIT LIST” for a section of a course when already enrolled in another section of that same course.
7. Students cannot be on more than one “WAIT LIST” for the same course.
8. The Admissions and Records Office will regularly monitor all classes with existing “WAIT LISTS” up to the start of the semester. When an open seat becomes available, the top student on the wait list will receive “PERMISSION TO REGISTER” and be notified by email.
9. On the first day of class, instructors will determine the number of openings available in the class, and then offer spaces to students who are on the “WAIT LIST” (providing they are present in the class) in the order in which their names appear on the list. The student is responsible for officially adding the class within published registration dates.
10. After the “WAIT LIST” for the class is exhausted, additional openings, if any, will be filled by the instructor in accordance with existing college and district policy.
11. Any and all other registration rules (conflicts, overload, administrative or student holds) may prevent the student from enrolling in a class.
12. Visit www.sccd.edu/waitlist for details.

Continuing Student Registration

Continuing students may register for classes after completing the following steps:

- See the registration information on page 7 of this schedule.
- Take the registration form and meet with a counselor or advisor for program planning assistance.
- Register on WebAdvisor www.cloviscollege.edu>Academics>Register for Classes or at a designated location. The registration form must be signed by a counselor if a student is on academic/progress probation.

Ways to Register

Students may register online using WebAdvisor www.cloviscollege.edu>Academics>Register for Classes or at Clovis Community College.

Late Registration

The last day to register for full-term Fall 2018 classes in person or online through WebAdvisor is Friday, August 10, 2018. The last day to register for full-term Spring 2019 classes in person or online through WebAdvisor is January 11, 2019.

During the semester, the Admissions and Records Office is open Monday through Thursday 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., and Friday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. On holidays and during breaks when no classes are in session, hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Proxy Registration

The federal Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) makes it illegal for the college to release a student's confidential educational records, including registration information, to anyone without the written permission of the student. Therefore, if you are unable to register for yourself, you may either register at a later date or have someone else substitute for you provided the following procedure is observed.

YOUR PROXY must have a written statement signed by you authorizing him/her to register on your behalf. If you prepare your own statement, it must contain certain specific information. Contact the Admissions and Records Office for details at (559) 325-5200.

YOUR PROXY should also have your registration permit, a list of classes you wish to take (including several alternatives) and sufficient funds to pay the necessary fees listed under Enrollment Fees on pages 130.

Accuracy of Student's Schedule

Clovis Community College does not keep your registration forms on file. Once your transaction has been processed and completed, all of your documents will be returned to you.

It is your responsibility to keep all registration materials in a safe place and to bring them with you if you have a question or concern about your schedule. We will be unable to help you without your documents.

Please be sure to:

1. Double-check all the information on your class schedule before you leave the registration area.
2. Make sure that your materials have been date-stamped and initialed by an Admissions and Records staff member.
3. Prepare a personal file in which to keep all of your processed forms.
4. Should you discover an error after you leave our office, bring your date-stamped documents with you to the registration desk for review and assistance.




Zero Cost Textbook Program

In September of 2017, the governor signed Senate Bill 1359, which requires all community colleges and CSUs to highlight course sections in the schedule of classes that have no textbook costs for students. Zero-Textbook-Cost (ZTC) courses are identified by this logo.

Online Registration Available Using WebAdvisor



Work Experience

COOPERATIVE WORK EXPERIENCE, GENERAL (COTR 19G)

1-6 units in one enrollment period

Students employed on a job that is not directly related to their college major can earn up to a maximum of six units in one enrollment period. Students must attend an orientation and the employer must agree to evaluate the student's performance.

COOPERATIVE WORK EXPERIENCE, OCCUPATIONAL (COTR 19V)

1-8 units: 75 hours of paid employment or 60 hours of unpaid employment per unit per semester

This course is conducted to give the student occupational learning opportunities and career awareness. Students may earn a total of 16 units in work experience of which only 6 may be in COTR 19G. This is accomplished through employment (paid or volunteer) providing learning related to the student's major or educational or occupational goal. Students may be required to attend an orientation. The student's employer must agree to participate by assisting in developing measurable learning objectives, verifying hours worked, meeting with a designated college official and providing an evaluation of the measurable learning objectives.

CHEMISTRY

CHEM 3A INTRODUCTION TO GENERAL CHEMISTRY (4 Units)

This is a survey course in the principles of inorganic chemistry covering the composition of matter, physical and chemical changes, atomic and molecular structure, inorganic nomenclature, chemical formula and reaction calculations, gas laws, bonding, solutions, net-ionic equations, acid-base theories, pH, oxidation-reduction reactions, thermodynamics, nuclear chemistry and equilibrium. The course emphasizes problem solving and chemical calculations. Both qualitative and quantitative theory and techniques will be covered. It is intended for applied science and non-science majors or for students preparing to take Chemistry 1A. PREREQUISITES: Mathematics 103. Topics include teaching as a profession and career, historical and philosophical foundations of the American education system, contemporary educational issues, California's content standards and frameworks, and teacher performance standards. In addition to class time, the course requires a minimum of 45 hours of structured fieldwork in K-12 classrooms that represent California's diverse student population, and includes cooperation with at least one carefully selected and campus-approved certificated classroom teacher. Students need to do their observation in a classroom that is in line with their degree plans. Single subject majors (History, Math, English, etc.) need to observe in subject area at a high school or junior high. CHEM 28A ORGANIC CHEMISTRY I (3 Units)

This course is a study of the structures, properties, nomenclature and reactions of organic compounds with emphasis on reaction mechanisms. The following topics are included: stereochemistry, alkanes, alkenes, alkynes, alkyl halides, alcohols, amines, ethers, epoxides, aromatics, and organometallic compounds, resonance and conjugation, kinetic and thermodynamic control of reactions, multistep syntheses, infrared spectroscopy, nuclear magnetic spectroscopy, and mass spectroscopy. Attendance

Most courses are offered on a pass/no-pass grading basis or the traditional grading basis. This option is not recommended for courses in one's major. To change a class to or from the pass/no-pass grading basis, the student must complete the pass/no-pass line-item on the program change form. Program change forms are available in the Admissions Office. The deadline to change a class to/from pass/no-pass grading basis is no later than 30% of the class length. For full length classes, this is the end of the fifth week of instruction. Please see the Admissions and Records Office for classes with class lengths less than 15 weeks for the appropriate deadline.

A maximum of 15 units of baccalaureate level courses may be taken on a pass/no-pass basis. These units will be allowed toward an A.A. or A.S. degree. Units taken as pass/no-pass will not be used when determining a student's grade point average. Students planning to transfer to a four-year college or university should be aware of the policy of that institution regarding transferability of courses with pass/no-pass grading.

Dropping a Class

(Deadline for a full refund: 2018 Summer – On or before the 1st day of class; 2018 Fall-FT is on or before 8/24 in person or 8/26 online; 2019 Spring-FT is on or before 1/25 in person or 1/27 online)

It is the student's responsibility to officially drop a class in which he/she no longer wishes to be enrolled. The last day to drop a class is the 50% completion point of the class. The exact date is available from your class instructor. Courses may not be dropped after this date, unless there are extenuating circumstances as approved by the Admissions and Records Office Manager. Any course carried past the ninth week (50% point), will receive a letter grade.

To withdraw from a class, a student may drop online by logging onto the WebAdvisor at www.cloviscollege.edu and click on the WebAdvisor link. A student may also complete a program change form and return it to the Admission Office for processing. There will be no grade entered on a student's record for drops occurring prior to 20% of the course length. A grade of "W" will be entered on the student's record for drops occurring between the 20% and 50% point of the course length.

Graduation Requirements

Graduation requirements for an Associate Degree from Clovis Community College may be found in the college catalog and in the Counseling Office. It is the responsibility of the student to consult a counselor regarding the proper sequence in which courses should be taken to satisfy degree and graduation requirements.

Pre- and Co-Requisites

Board Policy 5202(a) permits students to challenge pre- and co-requisites. Information and forms regarding the prerequisite challenge procedure may be obtained from the Counseling Office.

Transcript Requests

Students may request transcripts online at www.cloviscollege.edu >Admissions & Aid> Order Transcripts, Online Forms. All students are entitled to two free lifetime copies of their transcripts; additional copies are \$5 each and must be paid for in advance. Official transcripts will be mailed directly to the designated recipient(s). Be sure the name and address of the recipient(s) is accurate and complete.

Transfer Requirements

With careful planning, a student can complete their freshman and sophomore course work at Clovis Community College and be eligible to transfer to a four-year college or university. Students are advised to become familiar with the current catalog of the college to which they plan to transfer. It is also recommended that students work closely with their counselor in order to fulfill transfer requirements to the college of their choice. Additional transfer information may be found in the catalog.

Student Support Services

Admissions and Records

The Admissions and Records is responsible for collecting fees for parking permits, registration fees, Associated Student Government (ASG) fees, child care fees, etc. The Admissions and Records is located in AC2-130A. Office Hours are Monday through Thursday 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Fridays 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Please note: hours are extended through registration. Telephone (559) 325-5200.

Assessment

It is highly recommended that students planning to take an English class, a math class, or a class that has an English or math prerequisite or advisories take an English/math placement test prior to registration if they have not met the class prerequisite by other means. This test is by appointment administered through the Counseling Office.

A schedule of testing times and dates is established at the beginning of each month. Please contact Student Services at (559) 325-5230 for dates, times and locations.

Test scores are used for counseling purposes and to assist with correctly advising students' class placement. These tests are not entrance examinations, and the results will not prevent any prospective student from admission to the college. If possible, the placement tests should be completed well before registering for classes so that courses can be approved by a counselor on the registration form.

After a student takes the placement test, the student will discuss the test results and answers to the assessment survey with a counselor. If the student thinks the student may discuss this with the counselor. A student may decide to retake the test or make a course selection based on the total assessment with the counselor.

If a student wishes to take a class other than the one recommended by the assessment process, the student may discuss this with the counselor. If he or she agrees, the counselor will approve the student's entry into that class. If the counselor does not agree, the student may appeal the counselor's recommendations to the vice president of instruction by completing the submit a Prerequisite/Corequisite Challenge Petition (available from the Counseling Center or from a counselor). The student will have a chance to present his/her case at which time a decision will be made as to whether to enroll in the class.

Students who plan to transfer to a baccalaureate institution prior to the completion of 60 transferable units at Clovis Community College are encouraged to take the ACT (American College Test) or the SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) of the college board.

No placement examination is required as a condition for admission to the college.

Athletics

CCC provides competitive athletic programs in accordance with the California Community College Athletic Association Constitution. Support services for student athletes includes a comprehensive team approach to address the academic and personal demands of being a student athlete. The team is composed of an athletic director, academic counselor, athletic trainer, coaches and other staff/faculty. All athletes will participate in a supplemental academic program called CRUSH Academy. Men's and Women's Swim and Dive were the first sports to be offered at Clovis Community College with spring 2016 being the team's inaugural season. Men's and Women's Soccer teams followed in fall 2016. CCC's athletic programs are highlighted across the campus through posters, representation at campus and community events, interest cards, social media and CCC's Athletics webpage. CCC student athletes represent a diverse group of individuals that come to us from various communities including Fresno, Clovis, Oakhurst, Madera, Chowchilla, Sanger, Parlier, and Fowler. Approximately 70 student athletes are now a part of CCC's competitive athletic programs.

Bookstore

These students are provided with: Book Vouchers, First Tier Priority Registration, School Supplies, Work Study Opportunities, Specialized Counseling and Transfer Assistance.

Career Center

As of 2016, CCC developed the Career Center located at the main campus to provide students with career guidance and transfer resources. Counselors provide career services in person at both campuses (Clovis and Herndon) and through online tools, such as information on career planning, interest inventories, tips for interviewing, resume writing, and a variety of other links to guide students along their career path. Child Development Center

The Clovis Community College Child Development Center opened in the fall of 2007. The \$6 million facility was funded through a collaboration between the State Department of Education, Clovis Unified School District, State Center Community College District and First Five of Fresno, and it serves a dual role, providing high quality child development and child-care services for children, and as a model demonstration site for high school and college students studying child development. The Development Center is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children. Prior enrollment is given to Clovis Community College students taking at least 6 units per semester, State Center Community College District faculty and staff, and Clovis Unified School District employees. The program offers both full day and half day child-care for children 19 months through 5 years. Applications are available through the Child Development Center office. College Relations and Outreach

The outreach team aspires to be the best at facilitating college accessibility by helping students complete the application and matriculation process to Clovis Community College, State Center Community College District. We also connect students with the appropriate support programs such as Trio, Honors, EOPS, and CaWORKs to help students accomplish their educational dreams. In addition, our outreach efforts into the community has allowed students, parents, and guardians to be more informed about available services and programs on our campus.

Career Services

As of 2016, CCC developed the Career Center located at the main campus to provide students with career guidance and transfer resources. Academic Counseling (SEPs)

The Clovis Community College academic counselors provide comprehensive counseling services to assist students toward a successful college experience both in person and online. The goal of Academic Counseling is to facilitate the process by which students choose the appropriate courses and programs of study in order to earn a degree or certificate, transfer to a four-year university, and/or complete a vocational program. Academic Counselors assist students in the selection of courses and majors and with strategies to develop and achieve their educational goals. As a result of the Student Success Act of 2012, all students need to meet with an academic counselor to get a Student Educational Plan (SEP). Also, in order to maintain enrollment priorities, students must have an SEP on file. An SEP outlines a suggested course of study for the individual student based on major, transfer plan, and sequence of courses. Students are encouraged to update their SEP each semester or when a change is made to their major, transfer institution, or other pertinent objective. An SEP should be developed during the student's first semester at CCC and maintained throughout a student's enrollment at CCC.

In addition to one-on-one counseling sessions, Counseling classes for self-understanding & development are offered. Courses offered in these subject areas include: learning strategies, career awareness, student success, leadership, college orientation, and transfer preparation. Course availability varies each semester. The Counseling Office is open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Friday. The first Saturday of every month the Academic Counseling office is open 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Counselors are available on a walk in basis, by appointment for specific programs and services, and online. Hours are subject to change without notice. To schedule a counseling appointment, please call (559) 325-5230.

Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSP&S)

Disabled Students Programs & Services (DSP&S) is designed to provide specialized services and accommodations that assist students with documented physical, psychological and learning disabilities reach their maximum potential while achieving their educational goals. Dream Act (AB540)

The Counseling Center is here to provide information and academic counseling to new and continuing undocumented students at Clovis Community College. The California Dream Act is actually a combination of three bills: Assembly Bill (AB) 540, AB 130, and AB 131. Together, these bills allow undocumented and nonresident documented students who meet certain provisions to be treated the same as resident students.

Combined, these Assembly Bills constitute what is called the California Dream Act, and they allow undocumented AB 540 students to:

- pay the resident fees at public colleges and universities,
- apply for and receive private scholarships funded through public universities, state-administered financial aid, university grants, community college fee waivers and state-sponsored Cal Grants.

Educational Enrichment

Students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades who can benefit from advanced scholastic or vocational work can enroll in college courses and receive college credit through the Educational Enrichment Program. Exceptions to this policy are outlined in the Educational Enrichment Application. A student may qualify for the program with a cumulative high school GPA of at least a 2.5 (Juniors and Seniors) and a 3.0 (Sophomores), approval from the high school principal, a high school counselor, and a parent. Not all courses listed in the Clovis Community College schedule are available to the Educational Enrichment student. Generally, courses of a remedial nature, courses for which failing grades were earned, and courses required for high school graduation do not meet the intent and spirit of the program. Students must meet all the necessary prerequisites for any course in which they wish to enroll. Students admitted to the program are treated as new students each semester attended; and are eligible to register during the open enrollment period. EOPS Program

Extended Opportunity Programs & Services (EOPS) is a state-funded support program for students. The program provides assistance to students that is "over, about and in addition to" series received by a traditional student. Examples of typical services include: First Tier Priority Registration, Specialized Counseling, Book Vouchers, Cash Grants and Transfer Assistance. Students who have financial and educational needs are eligible for EOPS.

CAFYES (Next Up)

CAFYES is a support program for current or former foster youth who were in care at the age of 16 years old or later. Students must qualify for EOPS to enroll in program and take a minimum of 9 units.

CARE

Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education is a program within EOPS that is for single head of household students (with one child under age 14) who are receiving cash aid. These students receive all the EOPS services in addition to more specialized support.

Health and Psychological Services

Health Services and Psychological Services are integrated programs at Clovis Community College. We believe in a holistic approach to health. Our mission is to improve the physical, mental, and social health of our students and to strengthen and inspire the well-being of the entire college community. We know that good health is essential to success. Our goal is to provide students with the information and services they need to maintain wellness, not only throughout their academic career, but for a lifetime.

Health Services supports student success through a variety of services and activities that promote health and wellness. Information is provided to students in a variety of methods including personal consultations with the registered nurse, handouts and brochures available at the health office, classroom presentations on a variety of college health topics, online college health resource information, and outreach events.

Health Services provides health and mental health services including, but not

limited to, health screenings for vision, hearing, blood pressure, and diabetes; depression screenings; stress, sleep, and self-care counseling; referrals to psychological services; illness and injury evaluation, care and referral; birth control

counseling; Tuberculosis (TB) skin testing; and Flu Shots. In addition, free condoms, over-the-counter medications and personal care items are available at the Health Office.

Leon S. Peters Honors Program

The Leon S. Peters Honors Program offers an enhanced educational experience designed to challenge students with a specially selected curriculum. The focus of the honors curriculum is on preparation for transfer to a four-year institution. Taking part in an honors program enhances your transcript, improves your opportunity to transfer to a four-year college or university, enables you to develop closer relationships with instructors, and helps you explore your interests more deeply. Honors program students receive many benefits including priority registration, special transfer counseling, recognition on transcripts, and unique field trips.

The following criteria are used to determine eligibility for the program: Eligibility for English 1A and at least one of the following:

- Cumulative GPA of 3.5
- Graduation in the top 25 percentile of your high school class
- Completed SCCCD College Instructor Recommendation Form.

First Year Experience (FYE)

The FYE Program was designed especially for the first time college student, to assist in the transition from high school to the campus community. Starting college can be a confusing and stressful time. FYE will assist and support students during the first semester and beyond.

Library - Learning Resources Center

The Clovis Community College Library is located in AC2-148 and offers a wide array of resources and services to students, faculty, and staff. Study rooms are available for quiet or group study sessions and a large reading area provides comfortable seating with work tables. Computers, laptops, and tablets allow research activity, word processing, and presentation software programs. The library collection offers print resources including books, magazines, journals, and newspapers, as well as an E-book collection. There is a DVD collection of informational, literary and dramatic films as well as an audio book collection of fiction and nonfiction works. Research databases provide access to reference sources, articles from academic journals, magazines, and newspapers, literary criticism, streaming media, images, and more. The databases and E-book collection are accessible on and off campus, as is the library's online catalog which allows students and staff to locate and request print items from all our district libraries. Printers and a copy machine offer color and black and white printing at 25 cents and 10 cents a page. One-on-one reference and research assistance is always available. Psychological Services

Psychological Services is an integrated program within Health Services designed to serve students who are experiencing stress or other emotional difficulties. Frequently, these difficulties can affect a student's ability to function effectively in social, academic, or work settings. To assist students in overcoming these challenges, we offer individual brief therapy and group therapy.

We provide assistance and/or appropriate referral for issues such as anxiety, depression, grief, loss, identity struggles, relationship difficulties, substance abuse, and stress and/or test anxiety. We strive to offer a safe and positive place for students to address these difficulties.

In order to access complementary campus Psychological Services, you must complete a "Request for Psychological Services" form available in the Health Services Office, AC2-274 West.

The Psychological Service Office is located in AC2-278B. General office hours are Monday through Wednesday 8:00 am to 5:00 pm; Thursday 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm; and Friday 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, however, hours may vary. Student Activities, Clubs & Organizations

Clovis Community College offers a variety of co-curricular and extracurricular programs, including student government, clubs and social activities. Student Support Services

The Student Support Services (SSS) program provides opportunities for academic development, assists students with basic college requirements, and serves to motivate students towards the successful completion of their post-secondary education. SSS is a free federal TRiO program that serves students who are first generation, low-income or have a disability.

Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics Majors

The Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Program provides specific opportunities for students seeking Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics majors. We guide, mentor and motivate students towards the successful completion of post-secondary education. In addition, we assist students to successfully transfer to a CSU or UC campus. STEM is a free federal TRiO program that serves students who are first generation, low-income or have a disability.

Benefits of the Student Support Services include: Priority Registration, Academic Advising, Career Planning, Study Skills Workshops, Financial Aid Advising, Transfer Assistance, Cultural Events, and College Campus Tours.

Tutorial Center & Writing Services

The Clovis Community College Tutorial Center offers qualified, well-trained peer tutors in subjects such as English, math, and science. Peer tutors are available to assist students with writing assignments, subject comprehension, test preparation, and study skills development. Students may call or drop-in to set up a one-on-one appointment for writing; all other subjects are offered on a walk-in basis with several tutors rotating through the room to assist students. Writing tutors are trained to provide assistance on any academic writing assignment; during a session, students can work on the many aspects of the writing process, including topic choice, brainstorming, revision, document formats, and elements of editing. At the beginning of each semester, students taking an English course can also enroll in English 272 (Assistance in College Writing), a 0.5-1.0 unit, credit/no credit course. Students are put into groups of 3-4 based on course level; groups meet 2 times weekly for 50-minute sessions. Students are required to complete 27 sessions to earn 0.5 unit of credit or 54 sessions to earn 1.0 unit of credit. Writing services and subject specific services are available free of charge to all SCCC students (except for English 272, which carries a credit unit fee). Enrollment Fees

***Student Fees: Enrollment Fee**

Each student pays a per unit enrollment fee. The total amount is determined upon the number of units a student registers for each semester. (E.C. 76300; 5 CCR 58500-58509).

California Residents - \$46 per unit (with no cap)

NOTE: Enrollment fees for California residents are subject to change without notice per the California State Legislature and Governor.

If enrollment fees are raised after you enroll, you will be notified of the additional amount that you need to pay.

California residents may apply for a Board of Governors Enrollment Fee Waiver through the college Financial Aid Office. Effective Fall 2006, the Student Health Fee will no longer be covered by the Board of Governors Fee Waiver.

Non-Resident Tuition*

Any student that has not established California residency, out-of-state or international students, must pay a non-resident tuition fee of \$234 per unit for Summer 2018 classes; \$258 per unit for Fall 2018 classes. In addition, an enrollment fee of \$46 will be charged for each unit taken. (E.C. 76140; 76140.5).

Payment Due Dates

Please be sure to write your student ID number on your check. Allow enough time for payments to reach the college prior to the due date. The college assumes no responsibility for delays caused by the U.S. Postal Service. Postmarks will not be honored. Students who fail to pay by their scheduled due date may be dropped from their classes. All personal checks must be imprinted with the name of the account holder. Postdated and two-party checks will not be accepted. Students whose checks are returned by the bank marked "insufficient funds", "stop payment", "account closed", "refer to maker", etc., will be assessed a \$25 service charge. Returned checks can be cleared at the campus Admissions and Records office cashier's window with a money order, cashier's check, credit card, or cash—personal checks will not be accepted to clear returned checks. Returned checks not paid within 30 days of the date of the NSF notice will be forwarded to our collection agency and will be subject to all associated collection fees.

***Credit Card Payments**

Students are encouraged to use www.webadvisor.sccd.edu, the online WebAdvisor's "Make a Payment" option to pay their enrollment fees by credit card. If you are unable to login to the WebAdvisor, please contact the WebAdvisor Help Desk at (559) 499-6072 to obtain login information. Credit card payments are also accepted at the the Admission and Records Office (AC2-130A) or over the telephone at (559) 325-5200 during normal business hours.

***Credit by Examination Fee**

Application for Credit by Examination is available in the Admissions Office. If the application for the credit by exam is approved, the student must pay the credit by exam fees to the Admission and Records Office (AC2-130A), no later than

the end of the ninth week of the semester in the amount of \$10 for the first unit plus \$5 for each additional unit for each course on credit by examination (i.e. credit by exam fee for a 4.0 unit class would be \$25 plus the \$46 per unit enrollment fee* for a total of \$209. If California residency has not been established, non-resident tuition fees will also be added). The receipt for payment must be presented to the instructor before the exam will be administered. Financial Aid is NOT available including the Board of Governor's fee waiver.

***Materials Fee - Selected Courses Only**

In accordance with Title V, Section 59404(b) and Title IV, State Center Community College District may require students to provide certain instructional and other materials. These may include, but are not limited to, textbooks, tools, equipment, and special clothing (e.g. uniforms).

Such required materials fees may be:

1. The materials are used in the production of a course-related project or "end project" that has a continuing value to the student outside of the classroom setting; or
2. The required materials for use in the class have continuing value to the student outside the classroom setting.

Students who wish to purchase instructional materials on their own must secure advance written approval of the instructor and provide such written approval to the Business Office for a waiver of the material fee.

***Health Fees**

The health fee provides students with a variety of health care services. In accordance with Board policy, students are required to pay a health fee, regardless of the units taken. For on-campus classes the health fee is \$20 for each semester (fall and spring terms) and \$17 for the summer term. For off-campus and online classes students are required to pay an \$12 health fee each term (fall, spring, and summer). For students enrolled at both on-campus and off-campus sites, the health fee is charged at the on-campus rate. On-campus sites include Clovis Community College, Fresno City College, Reedley College, and Madera Community College Center. This fee is not waived by the Board of Governor's Fee Waiver. The use of on-campus labs or the on-campus tutorial center will result in an on-campus health fee.

In accordance with California Educational Code Section 76355, an exemption/waiver from the health fee is available to the following students:

- Students who depend exclusively upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination, or organization.
- Students who are attending a community college under an approved apprenticeship training program.

The Health Fee Waiver Form is available in the Clovis Community College Business Office and online. The form must be turned in at the time fees are paid. You have 14 days from the beginning of the term to decline this fee.

***Associated Student Government (ASG) Fee**

Students have the option of purchasing an ASG identification card for \$10 for the academic year which begins each fall term. Cardholders receive discount rates for admission to a number of college activities and may vote in student elections. For more information, contact the Clovis Community College Student Activities Office at (559) 325-5235.

***Parking Fee**

Students who choose to use an approved on-campus parking area must purchase a district parking permit. The permit must be displayed in the vehicle and must be visible at all times. 2018-2019 parking permits are: Summer 2018 - \$10; Fall 2018 - \$30; Spring 2019 - \$30; Summer 2019 - \$20. Student semester permits may be purchased in the Admissions and Records Office (AC2-130A) and the Bookstore. Staff parking permits are available for purchase in Admissions and Records only. One-day permits are available in vending machines at parking lot entrances. Metered and handicap parking are also available. Copies of campus parking regulations are available in the Admissions & Records Office or the campus Police Department. Permits must be visible at all times. Students requiring handicap parking should contact the Disabled Students Programs and Services Office at (559) 325-5230.

Associated Student Government Representation Fee

A student representative fee of \$1.00 is charged each semester, excluding summer sessions, to all students taking classes at Reedley College, Fresno City College, and Clovis Community College, including the community campus locations. The fee is charged at each location a student attends, so students attending all three locations would be charged a total of \$3.00. This fee is used for student advocacy at the local, state, and national levels. A waiver of this fee can be obtained for religious, political, moral, or financial reasons. Waiver forms may be found on the Clovis Community College website. For more information, contact the Associated Student Government at (559) 325-5391.

Refund Fee Policy and Schedule

***Refund Fee Processing**

It is the student's responsibility, not the instructor's responsibility, to drop a class by the refund/fee reversal deadline. A refund or reversal of enrollment, tuition and class material fees shall be made in accordance with the district refund policy. Students are required to submit a refund request form to the College Business Office. Requests may also be submitted online at www.cloviscollege.edu. Please ensure that all class(es) are dropped before submitting your request. The refund process may take up to eight weeks to receive. If fees were paid with a credit card the refund will be applied to that credit card. If paid by check or cash, a refund check will be made payable to the student and is mailed to the student's official address on record with the college.

***Refund of Enrollment Fees and Tuition**

Refund or reversal of enrollment fees and tuition shall be made following cancellation or withdrawal from class(es) in accordance with the following schedule. Refunds shall be initiated upon receipt of a written request to the College Business Office. Requests may also be made online. Refund requests are subject to an audit of the student's record to verify balance. Credit balances may be carried forward to the new term in lieu of a refund. Credit balances greater than or equal to \$15 will remain on the account for three years and amounts less than \$15 will remain on the account for one year.

***Primary Term-Length (Full Semester) Classes**

(a) Withdrawal during the first two weeks of the semester: **100% fee reversal**

(b) Withdrawal after the second week of the semester: **no refund**

***Summer/Short-Term Classes (other than 18 weeks)**

State code defines the drop deadlines to qualify for fee refund/reversals for short-term classes as on or before 10 percent of the duration of the class.

- A 100% refund is given upon withdrawal by the 10 percent point.
- No refund is given after withdrawal beyond the 10 percent point.

*Do NOT count holidays, weekends, or any other day the class is not scheduled to meet.

***Refund of Health Fee**

Students receive a refund upon complete withdrawal from all classes in accordance with the enrollment and tuition fee refund schedule.

***Refund of Parking Fee**

Full refunds for parking permits will be made during the first two weeks for the fall/spring semesters and the first week of the summer sessions upon proof of complete withdrawal from school. The parking permits must be attached to a Request for Refund form and returned to the college Business Office in order to obtain the refund. There is no refund for daily parking permits.

***Refund of Associated Student Government Identification Card**

Students must request a refund from the Student Activities Office Academic Center 1, room 160 (AC1-160). A 100% refund will be given during the first week and a 50% refund during the second week of the semester.

Financial Assistance

Students in need of financial assistance to help cover their educational expenses may apply for Federal, State, and Scholarship funds. Applications are submitted online at www.fafsa.gov.

Enrollment Fee Waivers

All California residents may apply for a Board of Governors Fee Waiver (commonly known as a BOG or fee waiver) to cover enrollment fees. To be considered for a fee waiver, you must be a California resident as determined by the Admissions and Records Office.

There are two ways to apply for an enrollment fee waiver:

1. Fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.gov and list Clovis Community College's federal school code (042534) on your application. Students who list Clovis Community College's school code on their FAFSA will automatically be reviewed for fee waiver eligibility. We encourage students to fill out the FAFSA because the application will be processed for federal and state funds with one application.
2. If you have not completed a FAFSA, you may submit a Board of Governors Fee Waiver (BOG) application. We recommend that you complete the FAFSA because the fee waiver application does not help cover books, supplies, or other college expenses.

California Dream Act: If you are eligible for in-state tuition under AB540, you may qualify for the BOG and state grants if you meet certain qualifications. For more information and to apply, log on to www.caldreamact.org.

Federal Financial Assistance

To apply for federal financial assistance, the Department of Education requires that each applicant fill out a FAFSA and provide any documents requested by the Financial Aid Office. Federal financial assistance includes:

- Federal Pell Grant
- Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG)
- Federal Work Study
- Federal Direct Student Loans

Federal awards are between \$287 and \$2,920 a semester. After you submit your FAFSA and turn in all requested documents, the Financial Aid Office will notify you of your eligibility by email to your school email address.

Withdrawing from School or Dropping Class(es)

Any federal financial aid recipient who withdraws from some or all of their classes may owe back funds if they drop before 60% of the semester is over. All federal financial aid recipients are reviewed for dropping class(es) and/or receiving all unsatisfactory grades. If you are considering dropping all or some of your classes and you have received federal financial aid, you should consult with the Financial Aid Office to see if you will owe back monies.

State Financial Assistance

The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) offers qualified California residents competitive and entitlement grants through the Cal Grant program. To apply for a Cal Grant, students must fill out the FAFSA and a Cal Grant GPA Verification Form by the deadline dates. The deadline dates for the Cal Grant programs ONLY are March 2 for entitlement grants and September 2 for competitive grants. Clovis Community College submits GPAs electronically for current students who meet certain eligibility criteria. For additional Cal Grant information, go to www.calgrants.org. If you are a current student and want to know if your GPA will be electronically certified by Clovis Community College, contact the Financial Aid Office.

Scholarships

Clovis Community College offers many scholarship awards throughout the year based on academic excellence, leadership, community service, and program of study. Scholarship funds are donated by the State Center Community College Foundation, Clovis Community College alumni, private companies, and other organizations. Awards range from \$100 to \$1,000. The Clovis Community College Scholarship Application, which is one application for all scholarships, is available from October 2017 to March 2nd, 2018 for the 2018-2019 school year. You may apply online at www.cloviscollege.edu.

Important Information and Reminders

- ✓ Keep your address and phone number updated through WebAdvisor.
- ✓ Fee waivers do not cover the \$20 health fee.
- ✓ Apply for a fee waiver BEFORE you register for classes. If you don't qualify for a fee waiver, you'll know exactly how long you have to pay your enrollment and other fees.
- ✓ When applying for financial aid and/or a fee waiver, read all instructions carefully.
- ✓ Check for submission deadline dates and class drop-dates.
- ✓ Submit all requested documents and forms to the Financial Aid Office as soon as possible.
- ✓ If you qualify for a fee waiver after you paid your enrollment fees, you can apply for a refund at the Business Office or online.
- ✓ If you are awarded a fee waiver, it will cover all classes within the State Center Community College District - Clovis Community College, Fresno City College, Reedley College, Madera Community College Center, and Oakhurst Community College Center.
- ✓ You cannot receive federal or state monies at more than one school, BUT you may receive a Board of Governors Fee Waiver at more than one community college. Make sure you list all schools you plan to attend on your FAFSA so you will be reviewed for fee waiver eligibility.

Gainful Employment

Campus Policies

Academic Dishonesty

Students at Clovis Community College are entitled to the best education that the college can make available to them, and they, their instructors, and their fellow students share the responsibility to ensure that this education is honestly attained. Because cheating, plagiarism, and collusion in dishonest activities erode the integrity of the college, each student is expected to exert an entirely honest effort in all academic endeavors. Academic dishonesty in any form is a very serious offense and will incur serious consequences.

Cheating is the act or attempted act of taking an examination or performing an assigned, evaluated task in a fraudulent or deceptive manner, such as having improper access to answers, in an attempt to gain an unearned academic advantage. Cheating may include, but is not limited to, copying from another's work, supplying one's work to another, giving or receiving copies of examinations without an instructor's permission, using or displaying notes or devices inappropriate to the conditions of the examination, allowing someone other than the officially enrolled student to represent the student, or failing to disclose research results completely.

Plagiarism is a specific form of cheating: the use of another's words or ideas without identifying them as such or giving credit to the source. Plagiarism may include, but is not limited to, failing to provide complete citations and references for all work that draws on the ideas, words, or work of others, failing to identify contributors to work done in collaboration, submitting duplicated work to be evaluated in different courses without the knowledge and consent of the instructors involved, or failing to observe computer security systems and software copyrights.

Incidents of cheating and plagiarism may result in any of a variety of sanctions and penalties, which may range from a failing grade on the particular examination, paper, project, or assignment in question to a failing grade in the course, at the discretion of the instructor and depending on the severity and frequency of the incidents. Drug- and Alcohol-Free Campus

Clovis Community College is committed to maintaining a drug- and alcohol-free campus. To that end, the college prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of controlled substances (as defined in Schedules I through V of the Controlled Substances Act {21U.S.C812} and as further defined by Regulations 21 CFR 1308.15 in the workplace). Behavior which violates this policy will be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with campus policies and regulations (BP 5410). Persons who seek information and/or resolution of alleged violations are directed to the Vice President of Instruction and Student Services at (559) 325-5214, the Dean of Instruction at (559) 325-5264, the Dean of Students at (559) 325-5265 or campus police at (559) 244-5911.

Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) outlines certain rights students have concerning access to and release of their educational records. Copies of District Administration Regulations implementing this act may be obtained from the Admissions and Records Office. Each student is encouraged to obtain a copy.

The act ensures that the students will have access to their educational records and that the college will not release their records to anyone, including any parents, who is not designated by the student to receive them, except as provided by the law itself.

The law authorizes the release of directory information in the absence of student objection. Directory information includes: name, address, date and place of birth, major field of study, current class schedule, participation in activities, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and last institution attended. Objection, if any, to the release of this information may be made at the time the student applies for admission or at registration.

Grievance Policy for Students

Any complaint concerning an alleged unauthorized or unjustified act or decision by any staff member which adversely affects the grades, status, rights, or privileges of a student is the concern of the Clovis Community College administration.

A student should see the following people, in the suggested order below, if the concern is an academic matter:

1. Instructor
2. Dean of Instruction
3. Vice President of Instruction and Student Services
4. Petition Academic Standards Committee (obtain petition form from Admissions and Records)

A student should see the following people, in the suggested order below, if the concern is a non-academic matter:

- If it involves an administrator - immediate supervisor
- If it involves certificated/classified staff - immediate supervisor
- If it involves another student - Dean of Student Services.

If the student's concern(s) remain unresolved, the student may submit the grievance in writing. Grievances regarding non-academic matters are submitted to the Dean of Student Services. If the student is not satisfied with the outcome at this step, a petition can be filed with the Committee for Student Conduct. Individuals seeking information and/or resolution of alleged acts of discrimination are directed to contact the Dean of Student Services at (559) 325-5265. The Dean of Student Services Office is located in AC2-235B.

Intellectual Freedom and Responsibility—Board Policy

Sexual Harassment Policy

It is the policy of the governing board of the State Center Community College District that no person shall, on the basis of ethnic group identification, national origin, religion, age, sex, race, color, physical or mental disability, or sexual orientation be subjected to unlawful discrimination in any program or activity of the district. It is further the policy of the governing board that the district shall maintain a working and learning environment free from sexual harassment of its students, employees, and those who apply for student or employee status. All students and employees should be aware that all institutions of the district are concerned and will take action to eliminate sexual harassment. Engaging in sexual harassment is conduct which may subject the harasser to disciplinary action.

Harassment on the basis of sex is a violation of State and Federal Law.

Sexual harassment means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal, visual, or physical conduct of a sexual nature, made by someone from or in the work or educational setting, under any of the following conditions:

- a. Submission to the conduct is explicitly or implicitly made a term or a condition of an individual's employment, academic status, or progress.
- b. Submission to, or rejection of, the conduct by the individual is used as the basis of employment or academic decisions affecting the individual.
- c. The conduct has the purpose or effect of having negative impact upon the individual's work or academic performance, or of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work or educational environment.
- d. Submission to, or rejection of, the conduct by the individual is used as the basis for any decision affecting the individual regarding benefits and services, honors, programs, or activities available at or through the educational institution.

Complaints of sexual harassment should be processed according to the terms of District Administrative Regulation 5109.

A copy of the District sexual harassment policy and complaint procedures may be obtained from the Dean of Students (559) 325-5265.

Open Enrollment Policy

It is the policy of this district that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section, or class, the full-time equivalency (FTE) of which is to be reported for state aid, wherever offered and maintained by the district, shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the college and who meets such prerequisites as may be established pursuant to Chapter II, Division 2, Part VI, Title 5 of the California Administrative Code, commencing with Section 51820. It is further the policy of this district that, in accordance with Section 51823(f), Title 5; health, safety, legal requirements and procedures will be established to meet such limitation.

Student Conduct

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a responsible manner whenever they are on campus or representing the college in any activity. Specific rules and regulations have been established in Board Policy 5500. A copy of this policy is available in the college library, the Admissions Office, the Vice President of Instruction and Student Services' Office, and in the Student Activities Office. It is also available on the Clovis Community College website www.cloviscollege.edu.

Conduct standards are designed to perpetuate the college's educational purposes, allowing students to enjoy the right of freedom to learn. Failure to adhere to the accepted standards will result in disciplinary action.

Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act

In compliance with the Student-Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990 (Public Law 101-542), it is the policy of the State Center Community College District and Clovis Community College to make available its completion and transfer rates to all current and prospective students. Beginning in Fall 2005, a cohort of all certificate-, degree-, and transfer-seeking first-time, full-time students were tracked over a three year period. Their completion and transfer rates are listed below. These rates do not represent the success rates of the entire student population at Clovis Community College, nor do they account for student outcomes occurring after this three-year tracking period. Based upon the cohort defined above, 21.1% attained a certificate or degree or became "transfer prepared" during a three year period, from Fall 2005 to Spring 2008.

Students who are "transfer-prepared" have completed 60 transferable units with a GPA of 2.0 or better.

Based on the cohort defined above, 11.1% transferred to another postsecondary institution, (UC, CSU, or another California Community College) prior to attaining a degree, certificate, or becoming "transfer-prepared" during a five semester period, from Spring 2006 to Summer 2008. Credit by External Exams

There is no limit on the number of external exams that can be applied to IGETC. External exams may be used regardless of when the exam was taken.

Advanced Placement (AP)

- A score of 3, 4, or 5 is required to grant credit for IGETC certification. An acceptable AP score for IGETC equates to either 3 semester or 4 quarter units for certification purposes. Each AP exam may be applied to one IGETC area as satisfying one course requirement, with the exception of Language other Than English (LOTE). (See Section 10.6.3) Students who have earned credit from an AP exam should not take a comparable college course because transfer credit will not be granted for both.
- There is no equivalent AP exam for Area 1B- Critical Thinking/Composition requirement.
- Students earning scores of 3, 4, or 5 in the physical and biological science AP examinations earn credit toward IGETC Area 5 and meet the IGETC laboratory activity requirement. Actual AP transfer credit awarded for these and other AP exams for admission is determined by the CSU and UC. International Baccalaureate (IB)

- A score of 5, 6 or 7 on Higher Level exams is required to grant credit for IGETC certification. An acceptable IB score for IGETC equates to either 3 semester or 4 quarter units for certification purposes. 


