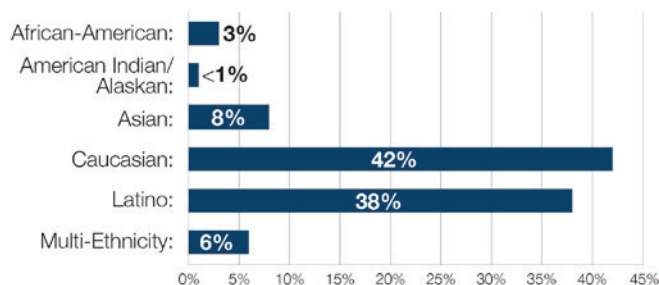
Crush Soccer Update
