


## A Message from Dr. Bennett

## **Applied Technology Building (AC3)**

When the district developed the state bond proposal several years ago, the College helped develop the building plan that was submitted in hopes of approval. As you know, we just received that approval through Prop 51 funding. Below is a list of the rooms/spaces that were included in the state bond project. We must follow the state plan that was approved, so these are the spaces we will be including in the new building. We have some flexibility about what goes into each room, but they must stay closely aligned with the original plan. Also, this building is Phase 1 of our bond-funded projects. We have another building already in line at the state for Phase 2. I'll share more about that one in a future newsletter.

Below are the details for our new building, called "Applied Technology Building" in the state bond documents. The BOLD names are the rooms included in the state bond. We have started brainstorming programs that could fit in each room. This is not a final list, just a good first draft of ideas. If you think another program could fit with one of these clusters, please let Lorrie Hopper or your Facilities Committee rep know.

#### **Applied Technology Building Plan Overview**

- 1. **General Assignment** Large Lecture Hall, approximately twice the size of AC1 150 (possibilities: large lecture hall, multipurpose room, small stage at one end for Performing Arts/presentations/events, other?)
- 2. Health Occupations (Occupational Therapy Assistant, Rehabilitation Aide, other healthcare programs...)
- 3. Water and Wastewater Technology (Water Treatment Management, Environmental Science, Geology, Chemistry, other?)
- 4. Environmental Technology (Computer lab, Computer Science, Digital Music?, Digital Technology?, other?)
- 5. Food Processing and Related Technologies (Food Safety, Microbiology, Nutrition, other?)
- 6. Electro-mechanical Technology (Mechatronics, Engineering, other?)
- 7. **General Studies** (Open Computer Lab, Other?)
- 8. Learning Center (about 1/3 the size of the current library, Tutoring Center?, Other?)
- 9. **Media Services** (Classroom with Distance Education visual Equipment, meeting room)
- 10. Office space (approx. 25-30 offices)
- 11. Conference Room
- 12. Workroom/copy center
- 13. Lounge
- 14. MIS service room

Those of you who helped build AC1 and AC2 know that the next couple years will be exciting and busy! We will keep everyone updated throughout the process.



## **Budget Update – Field Trip & Activities**

We are piloting a new process for faculty led field trips and activities this fiscal year. Previously, field trips were funded two different ways: completing an Action Plan Funding Request or requesting funds through your dean. There really was no process for faculty to request a student activity such as Speech Night. This year we wanted to have a process to make requesting funds easier and more consistent. We allocated \$15,000 for faculty led field trips/activities which was an increase of almost \$4,000 from the prior fiscal year.

We developed a form for field trips/activities and sent it out to all Clovis Community College faculty, staff and administrators. We received requests in the amount of \$25,180 and funded \$11,580. One large dollar amount request was not eligible for funding and another field trip request was canceled due to the event being moved out of state. We will send out another email in the next couple of weeks asking for additional requests since there is \$3,420 we can still allocate.



Clovis Community College has been named a 2019 Champion of Higher Education for exemplary work in implementing the Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT). We have been recognized for our dedicated leadership in working to ensure a strong transfer pathway.

## **District Strategic Planning**

The District Strategic Planning Council (DSPC) is currently developing a new 2020-2023 Strategic Plan to replace the 2017-2020 plan that will expire in June. The current plan includes four overarching goals: Excellence in Education, Institutional Effectiveness, Leader in Higher Education, Alignment with State's Vision for Success.

Over the past three years, the district developed annual strategic objectives (e.g., promote college going culture, promote a dynamic environment to attract, develop, and retain a diverse faculty and staff, etc.), which were selected to achieve the overarching goals.

On September 20th, approximately 75 student, faculty, classified, administrative, and community representatives from each of the three colleges and Madera Community College Center met at the Herndon Campus to identify new themes through the lens of equity using environmental scan data and Student Success Metrics data.

The DSPC will use the information from the workshop to develop a draft plan, which will be presented to constituency groups in October and November for feedback. Once all feedback is received, DSPC will finalize the plan and forward their recommendation to the Chancellor. It will then go out for review and approval by constituent groups with the goal of sending for a first read at the March 2020 Board of Trustees meeting.

## **Accreditation Next Steps**

Accreditation efforts continue to be ongoing at CCC. For the past year, the College is working on its Quality Focus Essay (QFE) action projects: #1 – Strengthening the Use of Data in Decision Making and #2 – Building the Infrastructure for Distance Education Program to Ensure Continued Success. These two projects arose as a priority for the College during the completion of the last Institutional Self-Evaluation Report, and the results of the projects are part of the upcoming Midterm Report to ACCJC, the College's accreditor.

The Institutional Research Department leads the efforts for QFE Action Project #1. Those efforts have included increasing data availability (such as the UP Plan Dashboard and the third and fourth annual Institutional Effectiveness Reports), data training with various departments and the Deans Council, data presentations on Opening Day and at committee meetings, and continued professional development for the Institutional Research team. There will be continued training and support for departments and committees as the College creates a culture of data-based decision making, and the accreditation team will capture evidence of these decisions.

The Distance Education Coordinator and Instructional Designer have led the efforts for QFE Action #2. As part of building infrastructure for DE at Clovis, the College implemented Quest for Success, a program that identifies and supports student readiness for online learning. In addition, the College offers its own DE Certification Course, and salary units for completing the course became available in Spring 2018. Forty-one faculty have completed the certification course. In Fall 2018, the College established the Distance Education Advisory as an oversight group for DE program efforts. The Distance Education Advisory made one of its first goals the revision of the Distance Education Handbook, which is currently going through constituency review. Finally, this action project also addresses the quality of existing courses through a course review process and professional development for faculty in the DE Flex Series and accessibility trainings, both of which are ongoing activities.



The Science Department here at Clovis Community College is working diligently to meet student demand at our growing college. They have hired several new faculty to help tackle this challenge. New Biology and Environmental Science instructor, Dr. Gizelle Hurtado is developing curriculum and lab requirements to support the Environmental Science program. Dr. Michelle Selvans, our new Geology instructor, is developing new courses and a Geology transfer degree all while expanding course offerings and revamping geology labs. Dr. Nader Inan, is newly tenure track this year and is working alongside other Physics instructors to increase course offerings. In addition, Clovis is one of the first community colleges to submit the Chemistry UC Pathway for approval.

In addition to all the work happening in science classrooms, the department actively collaborates with other departments across the college and supports student activities. Geology is working alongside the Elementary Teaching Program to support students who take Earth Science as part of that program. Biology is working with our sister colleges on the Bridges to Baccalaureate initiative with plans to pilot a research module, a joint project with John Hopkins University. Pre Health students will have the opportunity to go on field trips to both the Fresno County morgue and the Pre Health Conference at UC Davis. The Pre Health Club is active and will be participating in Rocktoberfest while Geology students assisted in the Great Sierra River Cleanup in September.
