- 4. Thoroughly and accurately describe the arguments for opposing viewpoints on philosophical issues.
- 5. Respond to objections to their own views and engage in rational dialogue on philosophical issues without resorting to logical fallacies or rhetoric.
- 6. See philosophical questioning and rational dialogue as valuable and essential elements of a human life well-lived.

To obtain the Associate in Arts In Philosophy for Transfer Degree, students must complete the following requirements (pursuant to SB1440 §66746 and CCR, title 5, §55061):

- Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units of degree-applicable courses,
- Minimum overall grade point average of 2.0,
- Minimum grade of "C" (or "P") for each course in the major, and
- Completion of Cal-GETC.\*
  - \*Students who maintain catalog rights prior to Fall 2025 may use IGETC or CSU-GE Breadth.
- Courses may double count in the major and Cal-GETC.
- Certification of California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) is required.
- Cal-GETC and major sheets are available in Student Services, AC2-133 or online at CCC GE and Major Sheets
